Pointing to Jesus



Last year was very fruitful for Bible Society despite turbulence both here and abroad. A big part of this was your continued generosity. We never take your support for granted. We hugely appreciate it, especially in the current economic climate.

What we did in 2022 as we learned to live with Covid was to reconnect with the Church through festivals, events and conferences, renewing our significant partnerships with denominational and interdenominational groups like New Wine, the Gather Movement, and the Catholic Bishops' Conference. We found ourselves continually asked to help the Church in its mission with the Bible. It's very exciting for us to be a mission partner for the Church.

Internationally, we held a series of seven forums, encouraging our Bible Society partners to work together for Bible mission in their regional context. We were able to respond collectively to the Ukraine crisis. Bible printing was rapidly mobilised and scriptures were distributed to Ukrainians. Your amazing generosity made our Ukraine appeal one of the most successful in living memory.

Reaching out to non-Christians

This year we are rebranding ourselves, as you may have noticed with this magazine. I want to be really clear that this is not simply about a change of colours and a different logo but a shift of emphasis to make ourselves much more accessible to non-Christians. We believe this is a moment of enormous opportunity for Bible mission in Britain and we want to help the Church take the opportunity of reaching out.

You'll see this if you look at our new logo, for example. When you examine it, you will see the Bible opening before you. You will also see an open door. And at the centre of it all you will see a cross.

At the centre of all that we want to do in our Bible work, with Christians and with non-Christians, is to point to Jesus.


Lent approaches once again!

Teaching a new generation to love the Bible in Egypt





While the number of young people in UK churches is declining dramatically, in Egypt there's a thriving Bible ministry with teenagers.

Your support is making it happen.

The penny is dropping for Samir, a young engineer from Egypt. He's having a moment of quiet revelation ... a sudden, unexpected fresh understanding of the Bible. It will change everything about how he shares God's word.

provided thanks to your generous giving.

'We need the big picture!' he exclaims. 'Without learning the context of the Bible passages we read, most of the

time we interpret it wrongly. We need both the near and far context to connect the Bible together.'

Samir is one of 1,000 young people who've been trained as Bible study group leaders in Egypt over the past year. He's part of an extraordinary ministry which is seeing a new generation engage with Scripture in a way we can

barely imagine here at home. God is clearly at work – and support from people like you is fuelling this incredible work.

A young, connected community

'Egypt is a collective culture, and much more religious than the UK. Children and young people here are receptive to God's word,' said Lois Nagieb, from the Bible Society of Egypt. 'So we're building on that to develop a love and attachment to the Bible among teens, to grow their Christian faith.'

Egypt has an overwhelmingly young population. More than half of people are 24 or under, and a third are aged under 14. Around one in ten people are Christian and the majority of these are from the Coptic Orthodox Church.

As an ancient, minority and often isolated community, life for Egypt's believers revolves around church. 'In one poor district in Cairo, there's a church with 3,000 kids and teenagers,' said Lois. 'The church is everything; it provides summer activities, a safe social community, entertainment for the children, health clinics, tutoring. Going

to church is not an obligation, but a privilege and a joy.'

Alongside this powerful sense of fellowship and togetherness, Egypt's churches place a high value on Scripture. God's word is central to the rich, meaningful liturgies which are celebrated in community – and our team build on this reverence by helping people engage with the Bible.

Inspiring Bible-reading

In this context, we run three vital projects for young people – and the first is about training leaders like Samir. We work hand-in-hand with the church to equip young people. Participants get into God's word in a way they never have before, their lives are changed – and then they, too, step up to support church activities, including leading Bible study groups.

'This programme has been a real breakthrough,' said Lois. 'More and more requests are coming from churches and the potential is limitless.'

The second element is training Sunday school teachers. Even providing basic support to 500 teachers a year can impact more than 20,000 children. Leaders receive tips on effective teaching, classroom management, understanding how children develop and how to bring biblical themes to life.

Finally, your support is providing the Bible online.
Social media is huge in
Egypt – the country has one of the highest rates of social media use in the world – and culturally, Egyptians prefer oral storytelling to reading. So the team are providing bespoke audio Scriptures for children

and teens, and more social media content.

'Serving and supporting'

The impact of all this is plain to see. Walk into any Egyptian church and you'll see children and young people everywhere, delighting in God's word and engaging in Bible groups.

'Your support is filling a need gap,' said Lois. 'You are serving and supporting the church with biblical materials and creative resources which are not only appropriate to the traditional context, but are helping young people love the Bible.'

New Bible centre in Egypt's new capital

As a new Egyptian city takes shape in the desert, Bible Society plans to open a Bible centre in a prime shopping centre.

Work started on the New Administrative Capital in 2015, and it's fast becoming home to Cairo's government offices and embassies as well as to millions of people. Our team have been offered a top location in the heart of the commercial district – and are hoping to raise funds to move in.

'This incredible new city needs a Bible presence, and it would be our dream to establish a

branch there,' said General Director Amir Elhamy (pictured).

Scripture in the Kitchen

There are hundreds of references to food and drink in the Bible and some of today's healthiest choices were part of the diet in those days, such as fish, olive oil, garlic, pomegranates, and, of course, milk and honey.

God initially prescribed a plant-based diet comprised of herbs and fruit (Genesis 1.29), but after the flood he blessed Noah and his sons (9.1–3) and widened the menu considerably by saying, 'Every moving thing that lives shall be food for you.'

Moses didn't mince his words in Leviticus 11 by laying down strict dietary laws. For bacon bap lovers back then it was bad news, as pigs were a no-no (11.7). Fish fans were delighted that they could eat anything in the water (11.9), but there was a catch, so to speak: so long as it had 'fins and scales'. Prawn cocktail? Forget it!

Now, we make our own decisions on what to eat. And we thank God for providing us with food.

This occasional column begins with two very simple Bible-inspired recipes.

Try them at home and be mindful and thankful to God with each bite.





Honeyed Fish

SERVES 2

They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate it in their presence.

Luke 24.42-43 (GNB)

Seafood was a staple in the Bible and a lot of it came out of the Sea of Galilee, a freshwater lake. Jesus ate a very simple meal when he reappeared to his followers after he had risen, showing them he was real and not a ghost! In some versions of the Bible, they gave him honeycomb with the fish.

Ingredients

1 tsp olive oil
1 garlic clove (chopped)
2 tbsp honey
2 tbsp lemon juice
2 tsp soy sauce
2 fish (salmon, trout or other medium-firm fish steaks)

Method

- 1. Spread the oil on a large piece of tin foil and place it under the grill.
- 2. Mix the garlic, honey, lemon juice and soy sauce in a bowl, and coat the entire fish in the mixture.
- 3. Place the fish on the foil under low-heat and turn regularly until done.
- 4. Serve immediately with rice or bread and some salad when celebrating the resurrection this Easter!



David's Blessed Buns

MAKES 8

And when David had finished offering the burnt offerings and the peace offerings, he blessed the people in the name of the LORD of hosts and distributed among all the people, the whole multitude of Israel, both men and women, a cake of bread, a portion of meat, and a cake of raisins to each one. Then all the people departed, each to his house.

2 Samuel 6.18-19 (ESV)

Ingredients

100g brown sugar
200ml warm water
1 tbsp yeast
300g plain flour
1 tsp butter
100g raisins
salt and your choice of spices like
ginger, cinnamon, almond essence
or mixed spice
1 tbsp honey (optional)

Method

1. Mix the sugar, yeast and water together and leave in a warm place for 30 minutes, so the yeast can start to activate.
2. Stir in the flour and butter and knead for 5 minutes.
3. Add your choice of spices and flavourings and then knead and shape into 8 round bun

- shapes.
 4. Place on a greased tray and bake in the oven at Gas 6 (200° C) for 20 minutes, till risen and a nice colour.
- 5. Lovely toasted with butter while reading or singing your favourite psalms.

Thanks for baking, thanks for biking (both for Bibles)

Thank you to everyone who biked and baked for Bibles in the autumn to raise funds for Bibles for Ukrainian refugees.

In September, our super cyclists rode with us as part of Bike for Bibles. We are so grateful for your support and together you raised £9,170. We have loved seeing your photos and hearing your biking stories. In total you cycled more than 3,000 miles, which is the distance from the UK to Ukraine and back.

Joshva Raja, who works for Bible Society, cycled to the Ukraine and Russian embassies in London as part of his challenge. And when he got there he handed over a Bible in Ukrainian and a Bible in Russian, respectively.

From September to November, our brilliant bakers raised over £1,200! From bake sales to bake offs and collecting donations in a church café, your efforts have raised enough to put Bibles into the hands of 240 Ukrainian refugees across Europe.

Thank you – at a time where Ukrainians are facing much uncertainty and anxiety, you are giving them the gift of hope and peace through God's word.

Salt and light in the Bible Lands

The Bible Lands are among the most conflicted, divided regions in the world. But thanks to your support, people are meeting Jesus and growing in faith – through three amazing Bible Society heroes.

It's impossible to ignore the stark contrasts in the Bible Lands. As you travel around, biblical sites abound ... the place where Jesus preached the Sermon on the Mount, the spot where the 5,000 were fed, the road where the story of the Good Samaritan is set.

But the rich biblical heritage jars with the visible signs of conflict, which are everywhere. The separation wall. The political graffiti. The military checkpoints.

Less than two per cent of the Bible Lands' population is Christian, and being part of a church is more about cultural identity than about lived-out faith. But in this volatile setting, people are encountering Jesus in the pages of the Bible – and he is changing lives.

Meet the three courageous people spearheading Bible work in the Bible Lands ...



Name: Dina Katanacho Job: Director of the Arab Israeli Bible Society Works with: the Arab Israeli community around Nazareth, and across Israel

- 30% of people in the area of Nazareth are Christian
- Arab Israeli community is marginalised and poor women and youth are a focus for ministry

Dina is a woman who gets things done. She's been sharing the Bible with this community since 2009, and has transformed the ministry. Today, Dina works with more than 100 churches of all denominations to distribute Bibles and help women and children, particularly, to engage with God's word. 'People need God,' she says, 'and if they don't hear the word, how can they believe?'

- Less than 1% of people living in the Palestinian territories are Christian

Fifty-year-old Nashat was born in Jerusalem, and even from childhood knew God had a purpose for him. He studied business and hotel management at university – but soon after entering the hospitality industry he received an invitation to join the Bible Society. 'I had trained to serve food in hotels, but God said, "You will serve food ... but spiritual food," said Nashat.

Now a dad of four, Nashat runs several centres in the West Bank with impactful programmes for women, leaders and children. 'There are poor people all around, not just physically but spiritually,' said Nashat.

'The gospel has no borders or boundaries; that's why we reach all. Whether it's through leadership training, peace building or trauma healing, we take the word of God to people in the hardest places in the land.'



Victor Kalisher is the son of a Holocaust survivor and pastor of a Messianic Jewish congregation in Israel. For 15 years, he's also headed up Bible work in Israel. His mission? To make God's word available, understandable and affordable to all.

Victor works closely with Messianic Jewish communities, who believe Jesus is the Jewish Messiah prophesied in the Hebrew Bible. These congregations see themselves as 100 per cent Jewish and 100 per cent Christian. He also oversees a huge Bible Society outreach programme in Tel Aviv's streets and parks. 'We meet many secular young Jews who are searching for something,' said Victor. 'And people are coming to faith among the migrant communities arriving here from Ukraine and Africa.'



Brick by Brick


Building a Bible House in one of the toughest places for Christians in Africa

There is a great and growing demand for God's word in Mali, despite the dangers Christians face there. The country has been beset by civil war and Islamist terrorism for many years and this presents the Bible Society team in Mali with enormous challenges. Bible work is made even harder by the lack of adequate facilities, equipment and infrastructure.

But the generosity of Bible Society supporters is about to make a lasting impact. Right now, Jacques Dembele, who leads Bible Society in Mali, rents offices from a sympathetic Muslim landlord,

but the man's family is hostile to the arrangement. The situation is very fragile.

So plans have been drawn up to build a sustainable and secure Bible House that will meet the growing needs of Christians in Mali. Land has been purchased and a building committee established, made up of a team of Christians – an engineer, architect and building contractor. They are giving their time for free to support the project.

Initial estimates put the construction of the Bible House at £650,000.

It will be a multi-purpose facility with staff offices, a bookshop, library, conference rooms and training facilities.

The site will also have its own well, providing water security. And an outdoor area with plants and benches under straw huts will offer an additional place for reflection and much needed shade. The Bible House compound will have some additional space to be rented out to small businesses or tenants, which will contribute in a small way to the financial sustainability of Bible Society in Mali.

Jacques and his team now need help to build the Bible House.

Bible Society's online Brick by Brick campaign offers an exciting opportunity for businesses, churches or donors to contribute and sponsor the building of a room, or a window, toilet or solar panels, or buy other essential equipment such as furniture and computers for the Bible House. Psalm 23 Garden project keeps on growing

'The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want ...'

When the Psalm 23 Garden was exhibited at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show, its designer Sarah Eberle encouraged communities, churches and schools to create their own Psalm 23-inspired gardens. Eighteen months on, you have taken up Sarah's challenge with style.

You've created Psalm 23-inspired gardens in churchyards, school grounds, plots of disused land, and even back gardens.

Psalm 23-themed gardens have popped up everywhere from Jersey to Liverpool, Cardiff to Norfolk. And every one of those gardens enables those who spend time in them to encounter the psalm, with God's love and hope. They are an embodiment of the scripture that will always live on. It's been thrilling to see these gardens grow.

Elizabeth Brandwood from Wallasey in Merseyside decided to create a garden at St Nicholas' Church, having visited the RHS Chelsea Flower Show. Poor soil and a location right next to the sea were no barrier to her dreams. She said she hoped that the garden would enable locals to stop and begin a spiritual journey.

'I think the hardest thing for people who aren't regular churchgoers is the first step. If we can provide a way in which they can access it easily, and feel the calm in this place, that's so important,' she said. 'I'm hoping that the garden will have an emotional effect on people and give them a place to sit and think.'

All Saints' Church of England Primary School in Marple, near Stockport, was one of several schools to create a garden for the children.

Sarah Holton was one of the team who created it. 'Because of the pandemic, we wanted the children to have some verses to hang on to at this point in their lives,' she said. 'We were struck by how Psalm 23 was so relevant. In six verses it allows the children to feel sadness and yet to know that God is with them in it all.'

Sarah Eberle's original garden is now in its permanent home at Winchester Hospice. Here it provides 'help' and 'perspective' for patients, their families and staff, according to the Head of Palliative Care, Maddy Thomson.

'To have this garden is the icing on a very, very special cake,' she said. 'It has provided so much life for the whole body of the hospice.'

Dealing with different attitudes towards the Bible

We are all humans made in God's image but we're not all the same. We are unique; we have our distinct personalities, and different likes and dislikes.

When you think about the people in your village, town or city, what are some of their attitudes towards the Bible?

How do people in your church use the Bible in their daily life? What things stop people from engaging with the Bible?

These questions are at the heart of Bible Society's Global Research Project exploring people's attitudes, behaviours towards and barriers against the Bible.

Why is Bible Society conducting this research?

We are approaching a point in history when nearly everyone on the planet will have access to the Bible. By 2033, it's thought that 99 per cent of people in the world will have a Bible in their language, which they can access online or in print. It means the task of translating God's word and distributing it around the world would be almost complete.



But having access to the Bible is only one part of the story. Like Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8, we need to help people engage with the Bible, shifting the Bible from a written text to a transformational experience which changes how we live.

What's involved in the project? There are two main aspects:

- Bringing together leaders of Bible Society teams around the world in Bible Engagement Forums
- Working with global research experts Gallup to hear what over 100,000 people from 100 countries around the world think about the Bible

The Bible Engagement Forums are taking place over three years from 2022 to 2024. Each year there are seven forums held around the world. Each forum brings together leaders of Bible Society teams who work in countries that share similar religious, linguistic and cultural traits.

These forums help increase everyone's understanding of how to make the Bible relevant to different people. Leaders learn from each other. They share stories of success and failure about Bible engagement activities they already run. They encourage each other. And space is given to listen to God's word and pray together about increasing people's engagement with the Bible in their country and across their region.

At these events we show the direct impact of gifts in wills, such as building a Children's Mission Centre in Eswatini, and try to give you an insight into something else, such as the Bible's influence in art, music or politics. We'd love to show






